Dear Friends,

By the time you read this, the ball will have dropped over Times Square and 2013 will have been officially welcomed. The traditional way to see in a new year is with hats and horns, toasting and merry-making – anything to mark the undeniable significance of having come through one set of twelve months and preparing to take on the next twelve. Revelry is good, but I have always felt that the most reasonable way to mark the flow from year to year is with prayer.

Give thanks to God for getting through the year just past, and ask for God's help in navigating the days, weeks and months just waiting to be filled up on those brand new calendar pages. As personal as prayers are -- since they reflect our hopes and fears, needs and desires – prayers also connect us to people everywhere. Children are taught to name family members and friends in their nightly prayers – and sometimes to pray for children in need, wherever they are. In church, the Anglican Cycle connects us to far-flung parts of the world, and our prayers for the Diocese remind us of the larger church here at home.

In recent weeks, we have continued to pray for those left homeless by the fall storms, especially at the Jersey shore, and of course, we pray for Newtown, Connecticut as that community tries to move forward, one difficult step at a time. It has often been said that the church exists for this -- to be a community called by God into prayer -- as worshippers lift up personal concerns and join together to pray for people and events that may not affect our daily lives, but need our support. In that sense, prayer is never private. In "The Lord's Prayer," the first word is "Our," not "my," because even when said alone, we pray as part of the community of Christians everywhere.

In the new year, let us pray for the light of Christ to guide our paths. Let us pray for God to turn the hearts of those who would perpetrate acts of violence against others, whatever their motivation. Let us pray for peace, joy, hope and love.

FIRST COMMUNION WORKSHOP, JANUARY 26TH

Every year at this time, we offer an opportunity for young people who are not yet receiving Holy Communion to take this important step in their spiritual lives. A workshop led by the rector is scheduled toward the end of the Epiphany season – one hour on a Saturday morning. The children make their First Communion a week later at the 10 o'clock Service on the Last Sunday after the Epiphany (which means the Sunday right before Ash Wednesday when Lent begins).

At the workshop, we discuss what Holy Communion is and means, and what is expected in going to the altar rail for this Sacrament. It is important to remember, that **nobody** understands fully what happens at Holy Communion. We know that Communion brings us closer to Jesus Christ and to one another. It has the effect of providing forgiveness, inspiration and a new spirit that is supposed to go with us when we leave church. Children always seem to know – ahead of time – that Communion is special because it is about Jesus.

If you have a child whom you feel is ready to begin receiving Holy Communion, please speak with the rector. At least one parent should join their child at the Saturday workshop.

Bring your Bible and join us in the Guild Room from 9-9:40 am. We have reached Chapter 22 in Genesis – an exciting book with lots of familiar stories (in addition to many lists of names).

ANNUAL MEETING IS JANUARY 27

In the Episcopal Church, the annual parish meeting is important. Because we are officially chartered in the state of New Jersey, we follow the state's religious corporation laws. We also follow canon law of our Diocese of New Jersey, with guidance from parish bylaws. An annual parish meeting is the equivalent of a shareholders' meeting in other corporations, and it is required by law. Following is the official "call."

"The voters of the Parish shall hold an Annual Meeting on the fourth Sunday of January of each year for 1) The election of Wardens, Vestry Members, Delegates to Diocesan Convention and the Watchung Convocation; 2) The receiving of reports from the Vestry committees, the Guilds, and all other organizations of the Parish; 3) The transaction of other such business as may properly be considered and acted upon at such Annual Meeting."

In the Episcopal Church, laity and clergy work closely together, and nowhere is this more evident than in an Annual Meeting. Annual Reports are distributed at the meeting covering committee and guild work for the year just ended. Our Vestry – made up of two Wardens, twelve Vestry members, and chaired by the Rector – meets monthly and members will be present to answer questions about their reports and to add comments if necessary.

The Budget for 2013 will be presented.

Our Annual Meetings are fast-paced and upbeat. They do not drag on! We begin with lunch – bagels and cream cheese and some other goodies – and the meeting is called to order when the time seems right.

There will be a film for young people, shown in the Nursery during the meeting.

There is no 8 am Service on January 27, in an effort to get everyone to come at 10 o'clock. The Rector's report is given as the sermon at the 10 o'clock Service.

CELEBRATE EPIPHANY – ON EPIPHANY, JANUARY 6

EPIPHANY is always January 6, but it is not always on a Sunday. Since it is a Sunday this year, we are going to celebrate.

Epiphany marks the arrival at the manger of the Three Kings who have come to worship Jesus. At the 10 o'clock Service, our Three Kings will be brought to the creche in church, and our young people will be invited to bring their favorite toy animals for a procession to the creche – where they will stay just until the service is over, when the kids will claim them to take back home. An interactive sermon will be part of the 10 am Service. Please come!



First Sunday in January (Jan. 6)

January 6 is Epiphany and the Sunday School will be part of our 10 o'clock celebration. Young people are invited to bring their favorite toy animal to church, and there will be a procession right after the Gospel to place the animals in and around the creche. (This is just for the Service. You get to take your animal back home after.) An interactive sermon will follow.

(Looking ahead – First Sunday, February 3, will be the annual Pretzel-Baking for Lent.)

WHO AM I?

When our dear rector asked me to write a small article for the January newsletter, I accepted without hesitation. Little did I know that the main topic of the article I so hastily agreed to write about, was me! I immediately had second thoughts about my rushed decision because writing about myself does not come easy to me.

As I drove home that day, I pondered upon what the focus of an article about myself should be. Should I speak about my native country, Cuba, and how difficult it was to leave it all behind, to come to the United States in the chase of a dream, twelve years ago? Should I write about what I left behind: friends, family members, and culture? Or should I concentrate instead, on everything I have gained: incredible friends, a new language, a house, a career, the sweet taste of freedom...?

And just when I was about to make my decision I flipped on the radio station in my car and stumbled upon the song, "I am coming home." Although, by far my favorite song, there was something about the lyrics that made me stop and reflect. As I listened to the lyrics...

"I am coming home, I am coming home, tell the world, I am coming home, Let the wind wash away all the pains of yesterday...."

I somehow transported myself to my childhood in a country where practicing any type of religious belief was forbidden and prosecuted. Sundays, used to be, for me, the worst day of the week. I never found a way to find happiness or joy on Sundays and so very quickly I began to resent Sundays and even fear them.

Until one day, in the summer of 1998, Cubans received the most unexpected surprise. The Pope, John Paul II, graced us with his visit! It is very difficult to express in words how much his visit meant to us, but I will try. Imagine a country where religion was forbidden and illegal, now opening its doors to religious freedom. When the Pope visited, everything changed. The dictatorship laws against religion softened, and many abandoned churches were suddenly crowded with thirsty believers who had never lost their faith. By that time, however, I had already given up on Sundays, and could not understand what the shift of consciousness was all about.

When I arrived in this country in 2001, I found a society rooted in their religious beliefs and suddenly found myself playing the piano for the local church. At first, it was a just a job, but it quickly became a way of life. And so one day, at a barbeque, our choral director, Andrew

Kilkenny, invited me to become a member of the *All Saints' Choir*. I was more than thrilled! At that time I was in the midst of pursuing my second master's degree, and the time of rehearsals conflicted with my schedule. Nonetheless, I promised myself that I would find the time. And I did.

Ironically, or maybe by God's design, I am now singing in what used to be my great grandmother's church. She was a member of St. Anne's Anglican Church in Jamaica, a long, long, time ago.

Now, the biggest mystery of my life was revealing itself in front of my eyes. I finally understood why my childhood Sundays were gloomy, heartbreaking and empty: I was missing God. I also understood why I treasured the lyrics of the song: "*Coming Home*." I can finally thank God for my homecoming. I am finally home, and in the church I belong to, the church that was denied to me for more than twenty years.
