#### Dear Friends,

We had a wonderful time at Diocesan Convention on May 4<sup>th</sup> where the twelfth Bishop of New Jersey was elected. It might seem that giving up a spring Saturday and getting on the road at 7:30 am would result in a somber and subdued gathering filled with disgruntled folks. But that was not the case. Charlie Beakes, John Burk (designated driver), Mary O'Connor and I had a jolly ride down to Trenton, and as soon as we entered Trinity Cathedral, we were caught up in the very spirit-filled gathering that was our Diocese.

Bishop Councell offered a stimulating homily at the Service of Holy Eucharist that began the day. There was plenty of hymn-singing and story-telling to pass the time between ballots as we waited for the votes to be tallied. It took five ballots for Chip Stokes to get a majority of both clergy and lay votes, so there was plenty of time for other activities – including eating. What was most impressive about the day, and most memorable, was the feeling of exhilaration that pervaded the Cathedral. There was a general sense of being there to fulfill an important assignment, and everyone wanted to do it well.

This uplifting atmosphere -- these feelings of concern and hope -- run counter to some of the reports circulating about the current state of the church, or "organized religion" (an unappealing term). We have heard the statistics about the steady increase in the number of people who claim no church affiliation whatsoever. This reality has had adverse effects throughout the religious world. But the very positive, uplifting gathering at Diocesan Convention indicates a large number of people – both lay and clergy – who are ready to help keep the Episcopal Church a vital force going into the future.

The Episcopal Church's Ad Project has a poster that shows a very threatening picture of what is meant to be the world – a fierce-looking globe hanging in the midst of nothing – with a caption that reads, "Without God, it's a vicious circle." It takes a community to explore this.

#### PACKING LIGHT THIS SUMMER

As I sat down at my computer to write this for the newsletter and began to consider what I wanted to title this message, I was struck once again by the fact that it is already summer. As a public school teacher, the summertime often seems to be contradictory in nature. Summer seems to take a very long time to arrive at times, and then it is here, suddenly. Maybe this is a mystery that can only be understood by people who are chronically overscheduled.

This year marks another milestone for my family that seems to have crept up on us as well. My wife and I were talking on a Saturday morning recently, and we realized that this year marks our tenth year as members of the All Saints' family. William was a toddler and Aidan had just been born when we first started coming. Although it was ten years ago, I remember the day that I carried a sleeping Aidan into the church during the week and had a lovely conversation with Jane about what All Saints' was like. There is a clarity to this memory that I find increasingly rare as I grow older. I have often wondered what made me pull the car over as I passed the church that day, but I never regret having made the decision.

All Saints' has presented my family with an opportunity that I never realized I was looking for. When we first came to the church, I thought that being a part of a worship community would be good for my children. I wasn't really sure what my expectations for my own growth were. For those long-term members of All Saints', I am sure the rest of my story will sound familiar. We sat in back at first (after all, this is an Episcopal Church). Everyone was very friendly without being at all threatening. Then the phone call came.

Chris Harris was a warden at the time, and I remember being surprised by his name on my caller ID. I answered the phone in between cleaning up from dinner and getting ready to make lunches for the next day. Chris said hello and asked me whether or not I would be interested in attending the upcoming Men's Dinner. Under different circumstances, I am certain that I would have examined my schedule and responded with regret. Again, I often wonder about the conditions that caused me to pick up that phone call since caller ID has provided us with the chance to delay communication until it is more convenient. When Chris posed his question, it caught me so offguard that I responded that I would love to attend the dinner. I didn't have a single excuse ready. Believe me when I tell you, I am not often caught without at least one plausible excuse at the ready.

The Men's dinner was a major milestone for me. I was able to see that there was so much more to the community that we had become part of than worship alone. Don't get me wrong, I think that Sunday morning services are a vital part of what we do and who we are. But we are much more than that. We are a Sunday School, an outreach organization, a social club, and a place to

get a cup of coffee and a smile. We support scouts, and theatre. We are a family in the truest sense of the word. Gathering with the people of All Saints' outside of the traditional Sunday Morning setting helped me to see this. Being a guest of Chris Harris also allowed me to get first choice on the Lawn Cutting List that summer (thanks Chris). Cutting the lawn got me an invitation to join the Buildings and Grounds committee. Kelly was asked to join the Sunday School. We were quickly being given the gift of discovering our ministries. Within a very short period of time, we were a part of this wonderful family.

Summer rhythms are different. Our routines will change. I will miss the routine that defines our worship and Sunday School service. I will also try to keep hearing the voice that tells me to pull the car over and go inside or pick up the phone even though I am busy. I will also think of my All Saints' family on Sundays when we are out of town and count my blessings.

#### MEET OUR BISHOP-ELECT

If you have worshipped with us any time since May 4<sup>th</sup>, you have heard us pray for "Chip, our Bishop-Elect." He is the Rev. **William Halleck Stokes**, currently the Rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Delray Beach, Florida. When he was elected on the fifth ballot at the special Convention on May 4<sup>th</sup>, Bishop Councell announced that he had accepted, and asked that people please call him, "Chip" – and so we are.

Chip Stokes was born in Manhasset, New York. He graduated from General Theological Seminary in Manhattan, and has served parishes on Long Island and in Florida. Since his election, sitting bishops from throughout the Episcopal Church, along with the Standing Committee of each Diocese (standing committees work with bishops as vestries work with rectors) are being given the chance to approve the election. At least two-thirds of both must approve for the election to go through. This is expected to happen, and Chip Stokes will be consecrated at Trinity Cathedral in Trenton on Saturday, November 2<sup>nd</sup>.
