You will go on from here, moving confidently into the future.

TAKING FAITH HOME

This was part of the theme of The Bishop's Spring Conference on Christian Formation that six of us attended at Trinity Cathedral. Anne Goetz, Chris Harris, Brenda Jackson, Joy Ogunyemi, Beth Wojcio and the rector found the all-day program fruitful in terms of presenting new ideas and things to think about. The conference was shaped by the reality that church fits into people's lives differently than it once did. Speakers addressed various aspects of this, suggesting especially that ways be found to help people bring what we do in church into their homes.

Our House Eucharists are one way to do this. Both the Family Eucharist in the DiSarno's home and Peggy Tristram's House Eucharist a week ago brought parishioners of all ages together to live their faith in a more structured way than we usually do outside of church. Both were wonderful and spirit-filled.

The Conference provided bulletin inserts for three upcoming weeks called, "Taking Faith Home." Each insert provides daily Bible readings for that week based on the previous Sunday's lessons. It has a special Bible verse to think on for the week, prayers and blessings, topics for discussion, ideas for outreach, a devotional "game," and a suggested ritual to establish at home. The point of all this is not to replace church, but to make it a fuller experience by moving beyond the one hour spent at worship Sunday morning.

JACK OF ALL TRADES

When I was six weeks old, I had a shot of whiskey and a surgical scar the length of my abdomen. At age two, I moved into the boys' dormitory at Bloomsburg State Teachers College in Pennsylvania where Dad was Dean of Men and Mom was Dean of Dad.

Home-schooled by seventy big brothers until the age of six, I learned how to give a hot foot, how a match can burn twice, and some phrases in Italian, Russian, Polish, German and Greek. My study of foreign languages ended abruptly when I repeated a few phrases to my parents. (My big brothers thought it was funny.)

The first six years of school were spent training college students to become teachers. I was assisted in this effort by twenty-nine classmates and six "training teachers." Six more years of intensive study (big brothers helped with home work and high school), and I graduated.

After high school, I spent twenty-six months visiting exotic and foreign places: Biloxi, Mississippi; Madison, Wisconsin; Champaign-Urbana, Illinois; Boca Raton, Florida; Riverside, California; Guam; Tinian and Luzon. All travel arranged by and paid for courtesy of the United States Army Air Corps.

Then came four years at Bucknell University, and I graduated with a B.S. (no comments, please), M.S. and Mrs. I was a guidance counselor in Cambridge, Maryland and in New Jersey (Woodstown, Millburn, Oradell and Madison). I retired after 44 years. Other work experience included: hot press monogramming, painter's helper, tomato mold counter, migrant worker's camp afternoon supervisor, YMCA day-camp counselor, ice cream manufacturer, sheet metal mechanic, assistant playground supervisor, electrician's helper, security guard.

Dad was a Methodist. Mom was a Lutheran. So naturally, we attended St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Bloomsburg. Dad said it was because Father Heistan was a great preacher. Mom said it was because St. Paul's was the closest church. Church services were at 8:00 and 11:00 am with Sunday School at 9:30 am. Evensong was at 7:00 pm. I sang in the choir at Evensong until my voice changed. After Confirmation, I served as an acolyte. My favorite weekday service was Friday at 9:30 am. (I missed the first period class in school.) Wednesday at 7:30 pm meant I missed sleep. After moving to Fanwood, I started attending All Saints' (in 1975).

Margaret Brooking had flown to Bloomsburg from her home in California to see her parents and attend our 30th high school reunion. I traveled to Bloomsburg from North Plainfield. Margaret and I first met in seventh grade, but in six years of going to the same school, we never had one class together. When the reunion came, we hadn't seen each other in thirty years. While

"catching up," we learned that each of us had been divorced some years earlier. Six of my married friends were going out for breakfast after reunion and they asked me to go along. Not wanting to be a thirteenth wheel(!) I asked Margaret to join the group, and she came along.

After two years of letters, phone calls, and cross-country flights, I proposed and Margaret said yes. I'll never know how I was able to get her to give up an apartment across the street from the beach in Alameda for life in New Jersey. Perhaps her parents being much closer helped.

Through thirty-four years of marriage, we enjoyed attending All Saints' and participating in the activities. The warmth of the All Saints' family was a joy to both of us, until Margaret's passing in 2008. Today, I still enjoy attending All Saints' and the great feeling of family.
